# PRESENTING THE THIRD FCR MASTER AGILITY CHAMPION, JORDAN! BY DEBBIE BROOKS PHOTOS BY CHRISTOPHER BUTLER

To be a MACH (Master Agility Champion) a dog must earn 20 double Qs and earn 750 points. To get a double Q the dog must qualify in both standard and jumpers in Excellent B on the same day with no faults. Points are awarded for every full second the dog is under standard course time. If you win the class, you get double the points. If you are second, you get to multiply the points by 1.5.

Jordie is my first agility dog. My good friend Kay Guetzloff talked me into giving it a try. Needless to say, it has been quite a ride. Jordan had finished her MX and had 7 MXJ legs before they started keeping points and double Qs, so she did not get any points from when she was her youngest and fastest. The first weekend the AKC did start keeping points, she picked up a double Q. Then another one in her next trial. Then I blew out my knee on an agility course. I was out for about a year with surgery and rehab.

I took time away from agility to finish her UD and SH, then went back to agility to get her last elusive MXJ leg. I tried to retire her after finishing her MXJ and did not trial her for about 6 months. But she made it very clear that she really was not ready to retire. About the time we got on a roll again, I had to have an-



other surgery. We got it rolling a third time then Jordan got hurt. Her injury was so unusual that I had to take her to Texas A&M for a diagnosis. She had surgery a week before the Chicago specialty and was laid up all summer. I considered retiring her again, but finished her rehab and she was ready to go.

Today is very bittersweet - as excited as I am to finish. it also means the end of an incredible partnership. Jordan is not the most driven dog on the planet, but mind myself how incredibly lucky she is the ultimate team player and she is quite concerned that I approve of her. At 8.5 years, Jordie will now retire. She can continue to swim, and she can do agility at 16" like Boss so she thinks she is getting trained. But I on that day. There are a lot of need to focus on my younger dogs really fast dogs with plenty of and she has more than earned her

retirement. I have promised her that if she wants, she can do novice preferred at the specialty.

We have had some spectacular runs, some absolutely horrible runs, and a bit of everything in between. There were several really good runs she had in which I made a handling error which cost her the run - I would get so frustrated with myself as she was trying so hard and I was not doing my job. She never seemed to notice but I sure did. I had to re-I was that she was happy and healthy at age 8, let alone still running with the big dogs. A MACH is not for the faint of heart because you can come so very close, but not quite good enough

points but not consistent enough to get the double Qs, and a lot of steady eddy really slow dogs that have plenty of double Qs but don't hardest (kinda like those last 5 get many points. Even this year at 8 years of age, Jordie was placing with a few wins. Besides the run that finished her today, the highlight of the spring would be her winning both standard and jumpers at the specialty for the only double Q and for High In Trial from standard.

During the GWFCRC hunt test, the specialty, and the Mission Circuit, I spoke to a lot of Flat Coat people who want to get into the Hall of Fame or finish a MACH. Having had the incredible good fortune to put three dogs into the Hall of Fame, I would offer some suggestions. If it isn't fun - don't do it! Sometimes we are so busy pushing for a destination that we forget to enjoy the journey. I know some people

who have calculated exactly what titles they need to get for the HOF. The last few points are the pounds!) - ask the others who have been there. Sometimes pushing the dog harder is the worst thing you can do and you need to take a giant step backwards and reassess your training and your goals. One of the more

surprising questions I was asked this year is why I continued to run Jordie and Emma in agility when they were already in the Hall of Fame! My response was because I enjoy running them and training them. My goal was for them to go as far as I could take them and the HOF was just icing on the cake.

Not all dogs will qualify for the HOF but that doesn't make them any lesser dogs. I count my blessings every night that Jordan and the others are happy and healthy. I am thankful to all my great friends who have been so supportive of the quest for Jordan's MACH - Tracy, Teresa, Lance, Laura, Tonya, and never forgotten Sarah - there is no doubt in my mind that Sarah was smiling down on us today.

So the next time you come up a little short, count your blessings for what you have rather than fret about things you cannot change. There is no doubt in my mind that today I took home the best dogs at the trial.

Puppy and Veteran Sweeps Mission Circuit Supported Entry May 29, 2004

**?** just wanted to take an opportunity to thank all the members of the GWFCRC for showing me such a good time. In addition to seeing so many nice Flat-coats I got to meet many people that I have spoken to but never met in person. A special thanks to Keith and Marianne for taking me out to dinner and for all the effort Neal put into the potluck entertainment. It was a pleasure to see competitors having such a good time together.



Candy asked me to write a few words regarding my observations and what I was looking for during the sweeps. First let me state that I was very impressed and thankful for the high quality of the competition that was presented to me. My decisions were difficult and based on minor differences in the dogs. In general on the first go around one gets a good idea regarding reach and drive and balance in the front and rear. As other judges will tell you; a lot of times the dogs that impress you most on the go around ends up in first. When a judge starts to go over the dog the first thing he or she sees is the head and Flat-coats are a head breed so it's hard to get past a bad head. However, I didn't have a bad head and the difference in the heads was not the deciding factor in my selections. I also observed a nice length of back and nice angulation in all of the dogs. During the up and back one can truly see the front and rear in isolation. In general the rears that I observed were great although closeness in the rear figured into one of my final selections. In general the fronts were good as well. However, the fronts are often where my decision was made in classes and also in my other final selection. Overall the quality was better than in other supported entries I have attended; heads, fronts, bone, rears and coat were what I was looking for. I thank you again for allowing me to judge your sweeps and see so many nice dogs.

# GONIOSCOPY INFO

On June 18th our club held it's second gonioscopy clinic with Dr. Steele. It was encouraging to see how many club members brought their dogs out to be checked. This procedure, which is quick and painless, lets you know if your dog has the potential to develop glaucoma later in life.

In hereditary glaucoma there is a problem with drainage from the anterior chamber of the eye. This condition is called "goniodysgenesis". This can be detected at an early age, before problems develop, through the examination of the eye with a special contact lens which allows the filtration angles to be seen.

There are two reasons to have this procedure done on your dogs.

Studies have shown that goniodysgenesis is highly heritable. If one breeds from a Flat-Coat with no, or very limited goniodysgenesis, then their pups will most likely not suffer from glaucoma. So breeders should be checking their breeding stock.

The other reason is that if you know your dog is likely to develop glaucoma you'll take eye injuries much more seriously than for the average dog.


