Specialty Memories

his was our first national specialty (a time of many firsts for us), we looked forward to the trip for months. Both nervous and excited, filled with anticipation of competing in conformation and field; we were not disappointed. It is an awesome sight to see hundreds of beautiful Flat-Coats groomed to perfection in the show ring. Although we did not place in the ring this time, it was a fantastic experience that we would not have wanted to miss.



Having the opportunity to compete for the first time in any type of field event was a heart stopping experience. Fortunately my partner in the field, a gorgeous little 7 month old bitch named Amy was nonplussed by all of the excitement. Doing what she enjoys best, she focused on the work and was able to place in unsteady singles. Unfortunately, the next day I let my partner down in the WC, we had a no-bird (our first) and when we re-ran being just a bit on the hyper side I turned her before the a big thrill by winning the 9-12 memory bird hit the ground. I felt bad for her because she would have enjoyed the water portion of the test. That failure will ultimately turn out to be a blessing in the long term for both of us as "not rushing" will be etched in my memory, a small price to pay for that important lesson.

We especially enjoyed the camaraderie of fellow participants at the field events, where everyone was cheering everyone else on. The Specialty was a special time, filled with times with good friends, making new friends, a time of learning, a time to make us thankful to be owners of such a wonderful breed of dog. y first comment about the specialty was how nice it was to be able to drive there with all the dogs in one day! I had to laugh at people whining about the trip since most of us from the left coast have had to do considerable traveling the last few years. PA was 2200+ miles!

Jordan had a great agility trial with a first in both jumpers and standard in the 24" excellent B class and picking up 26 MACH points (which puts her at 742.) At 8.5 years I feel so lucky that she is happy and healthy and still running even if not as fast as she used to. She got high in trial from the standard class, was the only excellent dog to qualify on standard, and had the only double Q. This was her last specialty in regular classes as she will retire after she finishes her MACH. Mambo had a nice jumpers run and was very close, as was Emma on the standard course. But close isn't good enough in excellent agility.

My baby girl Panda gave me sweeps class and placing 4th in the regular class. She is out of pure field breeding but is very sound even if she doesn't have the best head. Tracy showed Panda, but I showed Mambo myself and made the cuts in open bitch. Mambo also earned both her WC and WCX on Saturday - her first

triple and first honor. The water double on the WCX was the stiffest one I can remember running in the WCX's that I have done too.

It is still a honor to take the dogs in the for Ring of Honor and I am blessed to have two Hall of Fame



girls with me now. It is funny that a lot of people talk about how it is easier to get into the Hall of Fame now, and it isn't that big a deal, but standing around ringside I heard an awful lot of the same people talking about how they wanted to get their dogs in. While it is different than it was years ago when Jade went in, it still isn't that easy as you have to get to advanced levels in more than one performance venue. And if most of the points come from conformation, the dog still has to perform at an advanced level in one venue or be very, verv versatile.

One of the most fun classes for me was showing Jordan in veterans sweeps - she had such a good time, jumping around and barking and acting like a fool. So fun to see all the veterans out there. I mistakenly thought the rule had changed and entered her in field trial, but could not show her since she is spayed. She was disappointed since she can bark and be silly and eat in the breed ring.

I got to watch Lance with Nala and Jag - wow - they make such
